# Mentoring the Mentors

A Pilot Project in Information Literacy

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#### What

Develop a Writing and Information Literacy mentoring program in order to create an easily identifiable mechanism for students in selected courses to get peer tutoring from a student mentor who can address the interwoven tasks of writing and information literacy.



### What's Already in Place

## Writing Center Tutor Training

Three credit course in their first semester that emphasizes peer-tutoring skills.

## Ongoing Development of Tutors & Mentors

Weekly meeting for all tutors to address issues of interest including information literacy.

#### **Writing Mentors**

Robust writing mentor program in place. Experienced tutors matched with classes taught by faculty committed to improving teaching of writing.

#### **Faculty Development**

Writing in the Disciplines Summer Institute aids faculty in designing courses that address writing and information literacy.

## Anticipated Benefits of WIL Mentor Program

#### **Students**

Enhanced peer support for information literacy and writing as connected practices.

#### **Mentors**

Involvement in highimpact practice that is enhanced by addition of information literacy.

Opportunity to work closely with a librarian.

#### **Faculty**

Further integration of information literacy.

Deepen knowledge of librarian and mentor (students) perspectives on information literacy.

#### **Librarians**

Opportunity to mentor undergraduate peer-mentors.

Work on course development with a faculty member committed to information literacy.

- College of Arts & Sciences
- Enrollment capped at 19
- Meet Foundational Writing and Information Literacy
   Requirement
- Highly successful in retention efforts

- Personal relationship with faculty and mentor
- Abilities and skills of mentor
- Mentor not necessarily familiar with all research sources
- Delineate which info lit questions could be addressed by mentor, which to refer to librarian
- Once the class started...
- Rewarding and satisfying

Workload/time analysis of librarian and mentor commitment.
