With that in mind, I would like to take a moment to make you aware of some upcoming opportunities.

There is exciting news from NELLS (New England Library Leadership Symposium)! First, the application period for Tier II: Mid-Career Leadership is now open. This is what was historically known as NELLS, prior to the growth of the program. This year's retreat is being held in Stowe, Vermont from April 24th through April 27th. The application can be found at https://nela.memberclicks.net/index.php?option=com_mcform&view=ngforms&id=2153722#!/ and is due by February 17th. All applicants must be members of NELA (don't worry, there will be more information about this, just keep reading).

If you don't qualify for this round, or if you have already graduated from the program, maybe you would be interested in serving as a mentor. Vermont will have the opportunity to send one mentor to participate in the program, with hotel and meals covered by NELA. Per NELA: "Mentors should be comfortable facilitating small group discussions about topics such as conflict management, community building, strategic planning, resilience, diversity, and addressing modern issues in libraries from a leadership perspective. Mentors will help foster an open, safe environment for cohort members to explore ideas and ask questions." If this sounds like your cup of tea, stay tuned for more information.

I'm so excited that we and the Vermont School Library Association (VSLA) will be cohosting our annual conference this year on April 3rd. "Be the Place: Libraries are for Everyone" guarantees to be a great opportunity for all library workers to get together to learn, share, and grow. In order to make this conference more accessible, the VLA board voted to offer a limited number of stipends for those for whom attending would be an economic hardship, specifically library workers whose annual budget is less than \$100,000. When registering please look for the button to apply.

Membership is what makes all these opportunities possible. By being a member of VLA you qualify for a discounted membership to the New England Library Association (NELA). For just \$20 (Cedar level members can join for just \$15), you will qualify for a deep discount if you ever attend a NELA conference or workshop; and it's required if you want to attend any of the NELLS programs. I was also honored to attend the graduation ceremony for the inaugural class of ARSL Outstanding in their Field Leaders (congratulations to Vermont's own graduates: Bree Drapa and Margaret Woodruff).

There are opportunities of all shapes and sizes for librarians to take on a leadership role in Vermont. My decision last year to run for the vice president of the Vermont Library Association Public Libraries Section was quite honestly swayed by the fact that the title is bigger than the job responsibilities, which fits my needs just right. As I look to transition out of my year-long stint as president, our current vice president Catherine Goldsmith will be taking over, and she will need a VP to be working with. This is just one of the positions that will be available on the VLA board. One of the more exciting roles that my position as head of the VLA Public Libraries Section allowed was that it also includes serving on the Vermont Public Library Foundation (VPLF) board. Long time librarians may remember Dr. Burnett Rawson and his support of youth services through the Winnie Belle Learned Fund. Dr. Rawson supported initiatives that contributed to literacy, the love of learning, critical analysis, and intellectual exploration. The VPLF is excited to be launching a new Winnie Belle Learned Fund opportunity in the coming weeks (watch for an announcement shortly). Public librarians, this is a good time to start thinking about small projects that might have a big impact for the children and families you serve!

If leadership still feels like a by-product of your job, and the idea fits uncomfortably on your shoulders, there is a great opportunity to explore the concept further coming right up. The New England Library Leadership Symposium (NELLS) is a week-long leadership institute developed by the New England Library Association (NELA), and this year the institute will be held in Vermont. ALA Vermont Chapter Councilor Report

Hello from your local Chapter Councilor to the American Library Association. I attended all Council meetings virtually and this is my brief report. My full report can be found at this web address https://www.librarian.net/stax/5378/. It is my pleasure to serve as your Chapter Councilor.

Want to be a Councilor?

Would you like to go to ALA conferences for free and represent your state? I am more than happy to continue in this role, but I would also be happy to pass the privilege and responsibility on to someone else. Feel free to contact me directly, and I can discuss what is involved.

ALA Conferences Overview

The January conference that we formerly knew as Midwinter is now LibLearnX. This one was held in New Orleans and while I was somewhat sad to not be there in person, virtual attendance and participation worked really well. VLA also saves a lot of money by not sending me there, so I was pleased virtual participation was a real option for governance.

The ALA attendee report: 2653 attendees of which 1711 are regular members (i.e. not vendors, corporate members, or free attendees).

I attended three Council sessions and here are my brief remarks.

Friday, January 27

ALA Bylaws Convention, Special Council Session 1-5 p.m.

This meeting was specifically set up in order to finalize work on revising the ALA Bylaws. There were 12 articles that did not have amendments suggested, and we zipped through them. On the articles that did have amendments, they were concerned with various things and some small changes were made. The bylaws eventually passed. ALA and Council have been working for years to come up with a new governance model that is finally getting finalized and voted on. This will include a slightly different makeup and role for Council in the years to come, and I was happy to be a part of this change.

The overall bylaw changes were voted in, and there will be a new work group formed to work on changes to the policy manual.

Saturday, January 28

APA & ALA Council Meeting 3-6:30 p.m.

ALA-APA (Allied Professional Association) gave their report which can be found here: https://www.ala.org/aboutala/sites/ala.org.aboutala/files/content/ALA%20APA%20CD%205%20Executive%20Directors%20Report.pdf

Council voted whether to approve an extended timeline for a simplification of ALA membership dues, to approve dues adjustments (general price hike but with reduced fees still in effect and free membership for international members), and to try to standardize Round Table dues. There was lengthy discussion. I generally vote against dues increases even though I know most will eventually pass. I think if you are trying to live up to DEI values, cost concerns should be part of that.

There was also an important resolution on continuing virtual access to ALA Membership Meetings that passed.

Sunday, January 29

ALA Council Meeting 1:30-4:45 p.m.

Many reports were read out, all of which can be found linked above on my longer Councilor report. The Freedom to Read Foundation report was of specific interest. They strongly encourage chapters to join

Friends/Trustees are helping to organize the VLA/VSLA joint conference at the DoubleTree by Hilton in South Burlington, Vermont on April 3rd.

This year uniquely the VLA conference will be in conjunction with the Vermont School Library Association (VSLA). All libraries in Vermont work with school libraries somehow: family support, preand post-school literacy, training educators, providing health and legal resources... Yet the school libraries are administered outside the Vermont Department of Libraries. The Vermont library organizations are separate and usually participate in separate statewide conferences. This year the leaders of VLA and VSLA have been meeting together to create a conference program and to find suitable vendors. We hope to use this event to find continuing ways to bring our activities closer together in the future.

\$26.5 million in capital improvement funding will be available this spring: "Upcoming Capital Project Grant Funding Opportunities" on the Vermont Department of Libraries website (https://libraries.vermont.gov/upcoming-capital-project-grant-funding-opportunities). Senator Leahy, the VT Department of Libraries, and the Vermont Library Association's advocacy committee worked in concert with the Public Policy and Government Relations office of ALA to win these funds, and we will use the April 3rd meeting to support public libraries as they plan for them. State Librarian Catherine Delneo and her team at the Vermont Department of Libraries will describe the funding process. In addition, the conference is attempting to recruit appropriate vendors to help all of us understand how we might work together to apply funds most effectively.

I am currently only "acting chair" and would like to hear from you.
