Weathersfield Proctor Library

A few years back the archivist/librarian at the historical society discovered the original 1775 Articles of Association for the town. Using the list of the participants in that gathering a play is being written and produced to tell whether they voted for supporting the British or the American cause. Research has been done on each participant and costumes are being made. The performance of the play will be at the Fort at #4, at the local school, and at the Meeting House in town. A book will be locally published with all the documents referenced, the play, and an account of the production. Their 250th Committee includes the library director (Mark Richardson), a library trustee (John Waite), the president of the Weathersfield Historical Society (Ellen Clattenberg), and the archivist (Patti Arrison) who discovered the Articles of Association.

Woodbury Community Library

The Woodbury Community Library is part of their local 250th Committee and is using their grant for software to create an accessible file of digitized historical documents from the Vermont Historical Society. These documents relate to historical events and people of the town. The library will host a social event to present the information and expand upon the items in the collection.

Bixby Library's Five Towns – a Hotbed of Democracy

Bixby Memorial Library's program brings together Addison, Ferrisburgh, Panton, Vergennes, and Waltham, through the collection and the creation of an exhibit of new oral histories. Teen volunteers, collaborating with local history educators (Historical Societies of Ferrisburgh, Addison, Vergennes, and the John Strong House), will collect and share oral histories centering on themes related to democracy and the nation's semi-quincentennial. To promote diversity and intergenerational collaboration, students and community members will be paired together to record and share each other's stories. This approach encourages students to reflect upon the American Revolution and consider how their experience differs from those of previous generations. Students will spend time learning about American history and the fight for democracy; voting and the responsibilities of citizens; and the fight for civil rights and its associated challenges. These oral histories will unite with existing historical collections in an exhibit that represent the towns' distinct yet interconnected voices; bringing history to life and shedding light on the influences, perspectives, and hopes of those living in Addison County across the last 250 years.

Vermont Schoolgirl Sampler Driving Tour

In cooperation with the State of Vermont's 250th Commemoration of the start of the American Revolution in 1775, this is a self-directed driving tour of 20 locations (museums, historical societies, and public libraries) which have 19th century schoolgirl needlework samplers on view. These samplers are made by the descendants of Revolutionary War Veterans and showcase the values, artistry, and degrees of success of these families. Many privately owned samplers, never seem in public before, will be on view for the very first time!
