VERMONT HUMANITIES SPEAKERS BUREAU




- New catalogue released in Fall 2015, adding 13 new speakers and 41 new talks.

- New Vermont-specific talks cover topics like the meanings of maple sugaring, depictions of Vermont in film, and the state's evolving cultural diversity





READING FREDERICK DOUGLASS



Communities statewide organize public participatory readings of his compelling speech on or close to July 4 each year.

READING FREDERICK DOUGLASS



- Douglass's speech remains emotionally powerful and thought-provoking more than a century and a half after he gave it.
- \$150 post-event stipends available for host sites who submit a brief report with photos.

- Thirteen new series and 50+ new books added in the last 8 months related to Latino Americans history and to Pulitzer winners.
- Lowered fees to \$50 per event; \$25 this year only for new Pulitzer series.
